## Learning & Teaching 2021-22

It has been a challenging and turbulent year for teaching and learning at Ysgol Harri Tudur.

Pupils, students and teachers have worked hard to minimise the disruption to education caused by the Covid pandemic for a second academic year. Planning for the new Curriculum for Wales has continued, ensuring that Faculties are ready for delivery of a curriculum that places our learners at its heart. The efforts made by all during the periods of Blended Learning have been considerable and very humbling. Teachers have progressed their IT skills at a phenomenal rate, embracing new learning tools to help deliver a more interactive learning experience. Learners have worked hard to overcome the barriers of learning from home and the support staff were incredible in the organisation and deployment of resources.

Once again, teachers were given the task of designing and delivering a programme to assess our GCSE & A Level pupils, the results have been really inspiring. Our pupils returned to school just before Easter, determined and focused to do their very best.

In addition, we have been working hard to develop the range of learning experiences for our pupils. Two exciting developments for next year are the introduction of a vehicle maintenance course in the Phoenix Centre as well as a Woodland School (in our woods). Our Woodland School is a child-centred inspirational learning setting that offers opportunities for educational and personal growth through weekly sessions. It is a program that supports play, exploration and the development of new skills. It develops confidence and self-esteem through learner inspired, hands-on experiences in a natural setting.

Our goal remains to get high quality lessons to ensure all pupils and students are fully engaged in their subjects, making progress and working towards a holistic school experience, receiving qualifications and prepared for adult working life.



## **School Uniform**

At Ysgol Harri Tudur, we place an emphasis on pride in our community. A visible indication of this is in the standard of our pupils and sixth form students' uniform.

Pupils, students and staff have recently voiced their pleasure at the high standards we maintain. Many visitors have commented on the impressive standard of uniform at the school, and we have been particularly delighted at the number of comments we have received about how smart pupils and students look whilst travelling to and from school.

However, there has been a recent deterioration in the standards of school uniform from a minority of pupils. Whilst there are some genuine reasons for this, there has been defiance from some, which we do and will not accept. Hoodies, denim jackets, black puffer jackets, sequined bomber jackets, gilets or body warmers are not substitutes for the compulsory school blazer. Black jeans, leggings or jogging bottoms are also not permitted items of school uniform.

Please read below to clarify what the school uniform should be to ensure that your son/daughter is fully prepared in our correct uniform after the Summer Holiday.

We maintain a store of spare items in our school shop to enable students to maintain our high standards. Due to the closure of Tees R US in Pembroke Dock, we will be opening our own outlet at school, stocking and selling new and second hand school uniform items, including blazers and ties, with a range of prices, in our school shop.

If a pupil or student's appearance does not meet the expected standard, the school reserves the right to apply sanctions in line with our behaviour policy.

Where appropriate, a pupil or student who is not wearing the correct uniform could be

- Asked to return home to change
- Wear a clean item from our school shop
- Asked to wear a replacement item provided by the school until the end of the day
- Asked to wait until uniform items are brought to school by a parent

#### Non-uniform items will be confiscated until the end of the day.

To facilitate this process, our Senior Leadership Team will monitor uniform on a daily basis at the school gate. Uniform will also be monitored throughout the day.

Should pupils be unable to wear the appropriate uniform then please provide your child with a note explaining the situation and an indication of when the issue will be rectified (e.g. sole fallen off shoes, buying new ones tonight). We are more than happy to help provide your child with uniform if financial difficulties or genuine hardship prevents its purchase. ## Ysgol Harri Tudur / Henry Tudor School

Please find below an illustrative guide to the school uniform.



The prices below are sourced from our uniform supplier Tees R Us (embroidered items) and average costs from leading supermarkets (non embroidered). Prices are based on the 2018-19 academic year, so may vary based on sizes and stock for 2019. Price lists from Tees R Us are available on request from their shops.



Important notes: Trousers and skirts should be traditional uniform style – as sold in supermarkets and uniform stockists (no jeans, lycra, tight fit or rips will be accepted).

Make-up is not permitted in Years 7-9, discrete make-up is acceptable in Years 10-13. Jewellery is not encouraged; earrings should be stud / hoops only, hair accessories should be simple and avoid extremes of fashion. Shoes should be plain black, smart and 'polish-able'; 'sports' and 'casual' trainers such as 'Vans' are not permitted.

## Y8 Rock Pooling

Y8 pupils have had the chance to study the ecology of rock pools. This involved either travelling to Dale Beach or the mobile laboratory coming in to school. The Darwin Centre were on hand to lend their expertise and equipment. Pupils found, amongst other things, crabs, flat fish, jellyfish, periwinkles, starfish and even an eel! In the mobile laboratory, pupils got to carry out a squid dissection!





## Tree Planting



7N and 7O, along with the sixth form leadership team, helped to plant over 50 trees in the school grounds. This is part of a project to increase the number of trees in the Haven to do our bit towards combatting climate change. Trees are important in reducing the amount of carbon dioxide in the atmosphere. Pupils in Y7 and Y8 have done theme lessons about this in their science curriculum.

Pupils in Y7 and Y8 spent a day at Manor Wildlife Park studying endangered species and conservation. They completed booklets that will be used in their KS3 assessment of scientific skills. They also got to see the animals, feed the wallabies, watch the tiger being fed and to buy themselves some souvenirs from the shop to support conservation efforts at Manor Wildlife Park.

#### CREATIVE COLLABORATION CAPTURING CYNEFIN!

Due to a grant from Arts Council Wales, a selection of pupils in year 7 and year 8 have been lucky enough to take part in a creative project with local creative practitioners -Molara Awen and Phil Okwedy.

It is an exciting, creative collaboration between two AOLE's: Languages, Literacy & Communication & Humanities. Over 120 Pupils in Y7 & Y8 have been working with Molara & Phil over the past month, looking specifically at how creative lessons in storytelling and lyrics can improve their extended oracy performances and increase their sense of 'Cynefin.

# **ALN Reform Information**

In September 2021 the Additional Learning Needs and Education Tribunal (Wales) Act comes into force. This means the current code of practise for additional learning needs has changed. Our key staff have been receiving training for the new code of practice throughout 2021.



## Sixth Form

2021, notwithstanding its trials and tribulations, has seen another very successful year for the Sixth Form at Ysgol Harri Tudur. Throughout two extended lockdowns, our outgoing Year 13 showed dedication and commitment to their studies during the Sixth Form, which allowed them to meet the demands of the adapted assessments set by their teachers this Summer. As always, over three quarters of our Year 13 cohort have made competitive applications to university, with every one of our applicants receiving offers. Many students have already received early unconditional confirmations. This year we have seen applications to university for a diverse range of undergraduate subjects from illustration to civil engineering, from physics to fashion design and from media to renewable energies with dozens of other interesting courses in-between, all offering exciting graduate prospects. We are incredibly proud that we have three successful medical applicants this year, a course that is always one of the most selective in the UK. We also have a number of students who have chosen to further their education at either Pembrokeshire College or Coleg Sir Gar, studying Higher Diploma courses ranging from Computing to highly reputable Art programmes. For others we have helped secure apprenticeships with providers such as the NHS, whilst other students have been offered careers guidance in readiness for the world of work. We are, as always, exceptionally proud of all our students and the diverse academic routes and career pathways, which they have chosen, are testament to both their own ambition and the excellent Sixth Form curriculum provision at the school.

Year 12, by enlarge, echo the same successes as Year 13 and, once again, we are very proud of our Year 12 retention into Year 13 in what has been such a challenging academic year. Year 12 have just completed a Summer Programme where they have made a positive A2 Level / Vocational Year 2 start in all their subjects in readiness for September, whilst also pushing ahead with Welsh Baccalaureate tasks and completing an extensive research project in university and employment planning. We have been the only school in the county to invest in our Year 12 students in this way during this half-term. The programme culminated in a boat trip around Caldey, watching the marine wildlife and topped off with



## Headteacher's Message

All school leaders have to complete a number of statutory training courses, when they take up their posts. One of these is on pandemic flu. Little, did I ever think, when I completed this in late 2019, that we would find ourselves in a global pandemic as soon as March 2020 and still be dealing with it, as I write this in July 2021.

The pandemic has affected everyone in our school community in a considerable number of ways. Everyone's experience is different. We all have different views about what should and could be done, what is right and wrong about the current situation. Some people in society look for someone to continue to blame. There is no blame.

Certainly, from a school's perspective, our pupils and students have all reported a range of experiences too. Many pupils have shown resilience and determination to continue to be successful, knowing that this will soon pass. Our Year 11 and Year 13 are shining stars here; they returned from the latest lockdown absolutely committed to their assessments so that their Centre Determined Grades reflected their hard work. These will of course, be confirmed on 10th and 12th August. Many other pupils have responded very well to their National Tests. At the moment, it seems as if the current Year 10 and Year 12/13 will sit formal examinations in the Summer of 2022, albeit scaled back.

We don't know what September will bring at the moment for schools. At the moment, we don't know if we can hold assemblies or have face to face parent's evenings for example. I hope that we can return to many things that we used to do and embrace some of the new. Some parents have told us how much they like virtual parent's evenings, whilst some parents would still prefer an opportunity to meet face to face.

We have planned our school year 2021-22 to include all the aspects of school life that need to be there, covid prevalence and mitigation will determine how we do them. We will continue to operate a KS3/5 and KS4 timetable and stagger our breaks across the school day. There are no changes to the current beginning and end of school day times.

This pilot edition of The Tudor Times contains articles about some of the things that we have been able to do since returning from lockdown. It is unfortunate but a reality that Covid prevalence has increased in our community in the last two weeks of the Summer Term. Unlocking goes on. I hope that you will all get a sense of what we have planned, our expectations of our pupils and students and our ongoing plans.

Thank you to you all, our pupils and students, our parents and our staff and their families for your empathy, your resilience, goodwill and determination to achieve the best outcomes for your futures.

Flu-like symptoms, including myalgia (muscle ache or pain); excessive tiredness; persistent headache; runny nose or blocked nose; persistent sneezing; sore throat and/or hoarseness, shortness of breath or wheezing

Generally feeling unwell and a history of being in contact with a known Covid-19 case

Any new or change in symptoms following a previous negative test
